

Jerome Cranston, Ph.D 9:00 - 10:15

Jerome is currently the Executive Director, Student Engagement & Academic Success and also an Associate Professor of Educational Administration at University of Manitoba. Most recently, he has served in a university academic administrator position overseeing a staff of over one hundred and a multi-million dollar budget. Prior to that he spent sixteen years in the K-12 education system as a teacher, principal and superintendent in a career that spanned Canada's "prairie" provinces. He considers himself to be both a scholar and also practitioner in the broad field of educational administration, management and leadership. Dr. Cranston researches and teaches as part of a transdisciplinary, international "community of inquiry" on topics of education, social injustice, peace and human rights education. Dr. Cranston's work on teachers' conceptions of peace in post-genocide Rwanda earned him a 2015 American Educational Research Association award for peace education.

Descended from tribal and Anglo-Burmese ancestors and the Cranston Clan, he accepts that he is both colonizer and also colonized; but consummately Brown. He is fortunate to have married his best friend and contributed to the development of three amazing grown children.

Raheel is President of The Council for Muslims Facing Tomorrow, founding member of The Muslim Reform Movement, Director of Forum for Learning, author of the book Their Jihad – Not My Jihad, award winning journalist, public speaker, advocate for human rights, gender equality and dignity in diversity. Raheel has appeared in print and on TV and radio numerous times including CNN, Real Time with Bill Maher and BBC Hardtalk. In 2017 she gave over 100 interviews internationally and published over a dozen op-eds.

In her pursuit for human rights, Raheel is accredited with the United Nations Human Rights Council in Geneva through The Centre for Inquiry (CFI). She attends sessions thrice a year. In July 2017, Raheel gave testimony to the US Congress on "Combating Homegrown Terrorism". She runs a Forum for Learning with panels, discussions and international speakers.

She has taught courses on various aspects of Islam at George Brown College and Ryerson University in Toronto for the past five years. Raheel has made a documentary film called "Whose Sharia is it anyway?" dealing with the sharia debate in Ontario, Canada.

Jerome Cranston, Ph.D Keynote on Thursday, Feb 15 at 9am with Breakout Session at 10:45am **Grappling with the Emotional Pricetag of School Leadership**

It has been recognized for decades that being a principal or vice-principal is a demanding and, at times, utterly exhausting line of work. In fact, recent research suggests that principals and vice-principals have increasingly been asked to do more as their leadership roles have evolved and expanded. During the same period the level of frustration and stress associated with the job is leading to a decrease in the indices of well being. This keynote and follow-up session will present some of the Canadian and international data that highlights the socio-emotional toll that leading schools can have on the individuals who accept the responsibilities, and also suggests some practical strategies that might help alleviate some of the hard felt reality that accompanies such important roles.

The objectives of this presentation are as follows:

- To learn ways in which an individual with Autism Spectrum Disorder may view him/her self, others and the world
- To appreciate differences in brain networks which contribute to an altered perception of sensory input and thus often challenging behavioral output.
- To review strategies to support the mental health of individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder whilst being mindful of one's own self-care.
- To develop a deeper understanding of the intricacies of social misperceptions in Autism Spectrum Disorder and strategies to promote inclusion.

Safe and Caring Schools: A Whole-School Approach to Planning for Safety and Belonging

Schools in Manitoba are committed to providing inclusive, safe and caring learning environments. This session will explore four perspectives in applying a whole-school approach to planning for safety and belonging: comprehensive school health, social-ecological systems, three-tiered planning and strengths-based practices.

Cindy Jasper is a student services consultant from the Program and Student Services Branch of Manitoba Education and Training. Cindy supports the provision of safe, caring, and inclusive learning environments within the areas of resource and positive behavioural supports. Cindy is an experienced classroom and resource teacher, and school division inclusion and positive behavioural interventions and supports teacher.

Kathryn Roberts is a student services consultant from the Program and Student Services Branch of Manitoba Education and Training. She works in the areas of Guidance and Counselling, Safe and Caring Schools, and Student Services. A former middle school educator, Kathryn is an experienced classroom teacher, school counsellor and school administrator.

Darren Hardy / Dr. Karen Harlos / Dr. Wendy Josephson Safe and Inclusive Workplace

In 2016, MTS conducted an all member survey that focused on workplace atmosphere and climate. Entitled "Safe and Inclusive Workplace Research Project", the survey is part of a multi-organizational effort designed to help us better understand how members feel they are being treated at work. This session will focus on examining the preliminary results, with particular attention being paid to bullying and mistreatment and the impact demographic factors have on experiences."

Darren Hardy is an MTS Teacher Welfare Staff Officer. Prior to his employment with MTS, Darren worked for 18 years in the Manitoba public school system as a high school math and science teacher. Darren was President of his local teachers' association for 4 years, and served on the MTS Provincial Executive for over 4 years.

Dr. Karen Harlos is Professor and past Inaugural Chair, Department of Business and Administration, University of Winnipeg. Her field is organizational behaviour and she conducts research on workplace bullying and mistreatment, healthcare workplaces, and quality of worklife. Dr. Harlos has led and served on several large research teams. Currently, she leads a 4-year project on preventing workplace bullying and mistreatment in four large Manitoba organizations with Canadian and international decision-makers and scholars (uwinnipeg.ca/wbmp). Europe, Australasia and North America, and her published work appears in a variety of academic journals. She also provides training and consultation for conflict resolution, team building, leadership, and psychologically healthy workplaces (karenharlos.com).

Dr. Wendy Josephson is a Professor in the Psychology Department at University of Winnipeg, teaching and doing research in social and organizational psychology. Her research interests include children's and adults' aggression, including bullying in schools and workplaces. Dr. Josephson is a member of PREVNet, a network of over 100 Canadian researchers and over 60 youth-focused organizations collaborating to reduce bullying and promote the development of healthy relationships, where she currently focuses on knowledge mobilization.

Participants will learn strategies for developing LGBTQ inclusive classrooms and schools. Topics: Terminology (gender and sexual identities); societal norms of sex, gender, orientation and gender expression; supporting students who are coming out; starting and maintaining a GSA; and addressing everyday discrimination.

She knows that concepts, like people, are understood better with a personal connection, and she is passionate about learning, creativity, and people. Chantelle achieved a Bachelor of Education degree in 2006 and earned the Prime Minister's Award for Teaching Excellence in 2011.

Catherine Hart has been teaching for nine years. She has taught English and social studies at West Kildonan Collegiate, where she worked with students and colleagues to initiate and maintain a GSA. She is currently Vice-President of the Seven Oaks Teachers' Association. Catherine is passionate about promoting equity and social justice in schools and the wider community.


